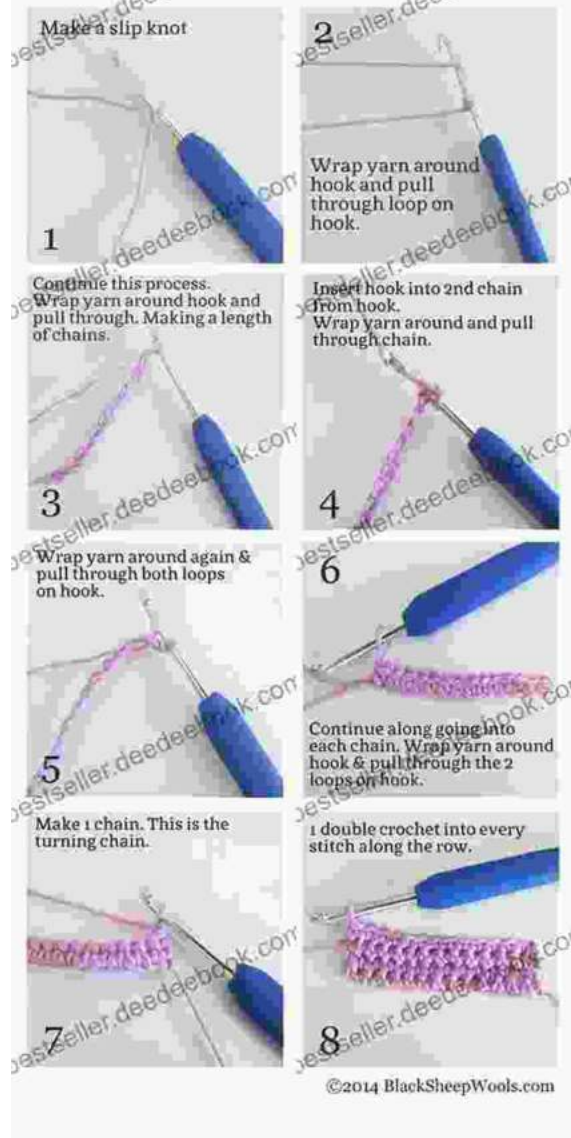

1. Yarn over and insert your hook into the next stitch. 2. Yarn over and pull up a loop. 3. Repeat Steps 1-2 four more times, for



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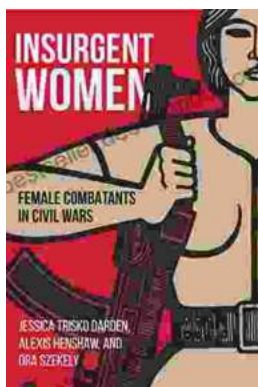
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
