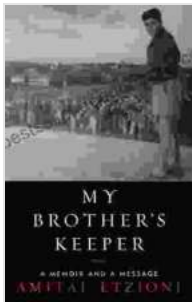

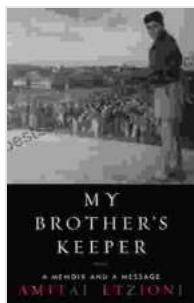
Jane Doe is a college student who received a scholarship through MBK. With the help of her scholarship, Jane is able to focus on her studies and is on track to graduate with honors.

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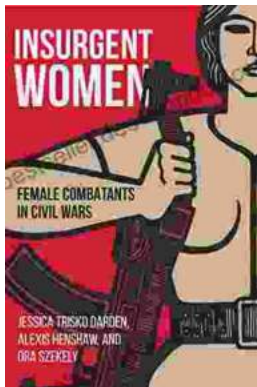
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
