

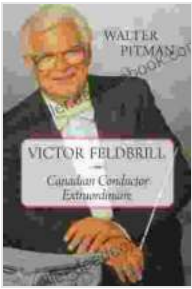
Victor Feldbrill: The Maestro Who Shaped Canadian Music

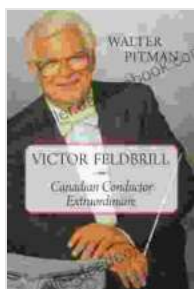
Feldbrill received numerous awards and honors for his contributions to music. These include:

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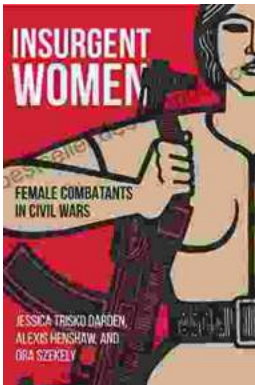
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
